RCIA stands for the "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults." It is a process within the Catholic Church designed for adults who are interested in becoming members of the Catholic faith. The RCIA process is not only for those who have never been baptized but also for individuals baptized in other Christian traditions who wish to become Catholic or for baptized Catholics seeking to complete their initiation through the sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation. Period of Purification and Enlightenment:

This period coincides with Lent and is a time of intense spiritual preparation, marked by prayer, reflection, and the celebration of various rites. It includes the scrutinies, which are special rites celebrated on the Third, Fourth, and Fifth Sundays of Lent.

Initiation Sacraments:

At the Easter Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday night, catechumens receive the sacraments of initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist. For candidates who are already baptized in another Christian tradition, they receive the sacraments of Confirmation and the Eucharist.

Mystagogy:

Following initiation, the newly initiated, now known as neophytes, enter a period of mystagogy. This is a time for continued formation and deeper exploration of the mysteries of the faith. It usually lasts for several weeks or months.

The RCIA process is a journey of faith formation, spiritual development, and integration into the Catholic community. It provides a structured and supportive framework for individuals seeking to enter or complete their initiation into the Catholic faith. The process is often facilitated by a team of catechists and takes place in a parish setting.
